

Protect What Matters



Dear Friends,

In the many years that we have been involved with the California Rangeland Trust, we have never felt so optimistic about what lies ahead. We're also proud of everything our outstanding team accomplished during the past 18 months ending Dec. 2014. Our feelings can be summed up in three words - trust, community, and success.

It's about trust

Here at California Rangeland Trust, the word trust is part of us. It embodies who we are. Communities trust us to take care of rangelands that provide clean air and water, healthy food, wildlife, and beautiful open landscapes. Ranchers trust us to protect their land and resources through conservation agreements.

How does this benefit California's communities? California is changing and we are growing and adapting to help our communities understand how important working ranches are. Drive down an open highway in California and you'll probably see ranches - the open vistas and green and golden rolling hills that make you appreciate living here. Those ranches are where 95% of California's water flows, where most endangered and threatened species live, and where local food grows. They also contribute more than \$3 billion dollars to California's economy each year.

A year of success

This was a year of success at the Rangeland Trust. We recently changed our fiscal year to the calendar year. This report reflects the past year and half. With your help from July 2013 through December 2014, we protected five working ranches totaling more than 8,000 acres of privately-owned rangeland.

One ranch we are very proud of conserving is Dutchman Creek in Merced County. On these 500 acres of rangeland, vernal pools exist with important habitat for six endangered or threatened native species.

Dry Creek Ranch is another ranch in Merced

County conserved by the Rangeland Trust. The 4,400-acre ranch is abundant with water sources including extensive vernal pool grasslands that support fairy shrimp, California tiger salamander, and several threatened plant species.

Bufford Ranch is located in Kern County. This 500-acre foothill ranch is the home to lots of California's historical artifacts as well as wildlife, cattle, and beautiful wildflowers.

The Sardella Ranch in Tuolumne County is a third generation working cattle ranch. We are proud to conserve this 500-acre ranch for future generations.

In Monterey County we conserved the 2,000acre Wilmar Ranch. This large ranch is home to endangered species and features beautiful oak woodland areas. A portion of this ranch was gifted to the Rangeland Trust in 2009.



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Outreach and Events

We hosted several events that inspired, encouraged, and informed new supporters during this fiscal year.

Whole Foods Market 5% Day

On September 29, 2013 the Rangeland Trust had the honor of being the Whole Foods Market 5% Day recipient for the entire Northern California region. Through this partnership we raised \$164,990 for rangeland conservation in California and we had the opportunity to partner with Panorama Organic Grass-Fed Meats to serve beef samples in the stores. This allowed Rangeland Trust ambassadors to have meaningful conversations with shoppers about ranching.

Gather at the Sweet Ranch

On a sunny and windy Saturday in September 2013, Rangeland Trust Chairman Darrel Sweet, his wife Karen, and their family welcomed 25 guests to their ranch on the eastern edge of Livermore in Alameda County to enjoy a day on the land. Guests included representatives from the local newspaper, Zone 7 Water District, the California Coastal Conservancy, the City of Livermore, AT&T, Mechanics Bank, UC Cooperative Extension, UC Berkeley, former Rangeland Trust director and current California Cattlemen's Association President Tim Koopmann, and Rangeland Trust Legacy Council member Kelly Cash.

Hearst Ranch Anniversary Celebration









Revenues
